Got Cabin Fever? Visit Necedah National Wildlife Refuge

Escape to Necedah National Wildlife Refuge on Saturday, February 25, 2012 beginning at 9:00 am to participate in fun winter hobbies. Learn how to tie flies, create wildlife themed cards, scrapbook pages, wild quilt squares, carve wooden birds, trapping, skinning, and make pinecone birdfeeders. Take part in snowshoe hikes at 10:30am and 1:30pm and mingle with volunteers and staff of the Necedah National Wildlife Refuge. In addition to the day-long activities viewings of "Green Fire: Aldo Leopold and a Land Ethic For Our Time" will be shown at 9:00am and 1:00pm. The first full-length, 75-minute, high-definition documentary film ever made about legendary environmentalist Aldo Leopold, *Green Fire* highlights Leopold's extraordinary career, tracing how he shaped and influenced the modern environmental movement. Leopold remains relevant today, inspiring projects all over the country that connect people and land.

Children must be accompanied by an adult. A free lunch will be provided by the Friends of Necedah National Wildlife Refuge. All activities are located in the Necedah Refuge Visitor Center. The free event is open to the public, and is sponsored by the Friends of Necedah National Wildlife Refuge. Activities end at 3:00 pm.

Necedah National Wildlife Refuge Visitor Center is open Monday through Saturday 7:30am to 4pm, and is located off of Highway 21 four miles west of the Village of Necedah or 18 miles east of Tomah. Turn north onto Headquarters Road. Follow Headquarters road for two miles and follow the sign for the Necedah Visitor Center.
